We were very pleased to receive a significant sum of money from Sport Waikato thanks to the work of Sam our sports-fit coordinator. This funding is going toward buying hoe and life jackets for our newly formed, and already successful, waka ama teams. Thanks also to our community who have generously supported this kaupapa.

A group of our students visited the Windmills on the wind farm on Wednesday, with the support of Meridian Energy. This was followed by a BBQ and with the support of lots of community members they are planting some three hundred more trees onto the peninsular. Much thanks to Meridian Energy, WEL Networks, Oliver of Sustainable Coastlines, and the many helpers for your support and mahi.

I have been asked to give some details re the erecting of a waharoa during the reunion weekend. A waharoa is a gateway or main entrance. In this case with a carved crossbeam some five metres long. There are four manaia carved to represent our values and the single wheku (Face) represents He Manu (the bird). This refers to the whakatauki (Saying); Ko te manu e kai ana te miro, nōna te ngāhere. Ko te manu e kai ana te mātauranga, nōna te ao (The bird who eats from the miro tree, owns the forest. The bird who eats of the tree of knowledge will gain the world.) The ribs along the bottom represent those that attended this kura before us and the Takarangi Spiral (open spiral that allows light and knowledge into the world) is full of manaia represents our natural world. The carving is almost complete, the pou have been organised and holes are being dug. This will be an exciting addition to the kura and the dawn blessing is on the Saturday of labour weekend at 5:50 a.m.

E3 Science Focus

For the past few weeks, E3 has been doing lots of science! We have been learning all about liquids. Did you know that liquids can change states? If you freeze it, it becomes a solid. If you heat it, it becomes a gas.

There are many types of liquids. Some are more viscous than others. For example, honey has a high viscosity. It takes a long time to pour because it flows slowly. If you compare honey to water, you will see that water is less viscous. It pours quickly.

Have you ever wondered what makes your fizzy drink fizz? It's carbon dioxide that has been compressed into the bottle. We made balloons blow up with carbon dioxide. We put baking soda and vinegar in a bottle with a balloon stretched over the neck of the bottle. The baking soda and vinegar reacted and made carbon dioxide, which blew up the balloon.

Here's an exciting experiment you can try at home (it's a bit messy, so be careful!): mix two cups of cornflour with one cup of water. Mix it up with your fingers and you get oobleck. Oobleck is a special liquid because it is Non-Newtonian. If you squeeze it in your hand, it feels solid. When you let it go, it will run through your fingers like a liquid.
