Learning Skill

The curriculum is constantly evolving to ensure that we help students learn in a way that prepares them for tomorrow's world. It is designed to provide students with a strong foundation for learning through programmes that are engaging and authentic, allowing learners to achieve academic excellence and a life long love of learning.

The Year 7-10 team and working with our students so that can become effective learners. One hour every week the students have the opportunity to go and focus on a learning skill that they feel they need to work on. After 10 weeks the students can then either re:engage in the same learning skill or choose another.

Thinking	Acquisition of knowledge, Comprehension, Application, Analysis, Synthesis, Evaluation, and Dialectical thought, Metacognition

Gateway 2017

Gateway 2017 is off to a great start with four Y12 students experiencing the service industry by participating in The Warehouse Red Shirts in Schools programme. This programme runs nationwide and consists of 10days work experience over 10 weeks. It covers principles of customer service and results in the Customer Service Award - made up of 22 credits towards the National Certificate in Retail (Level 2) and NCEA (Level 2).

What is Gateway?

Gateway is a Tertiary Education Commission initiative that gives senior students the opportunity to get important work experience in their chosen profession and help make the move from school into a career.

Raglan Time Bank

The Raglan Timebank is one of many timebanks that are growing around New Zealand to build stronger more resilient local communities.

TimeBanking is a way of trading skills in a community. It uses time, rather than money, as the measurement tool.

As a member of the timebank you share your skills with other members within the community and are given a credit for every hour of work you do. With the credits you gain, you can 'buy' someone else's time, and get the service you need. It is always an hour for an hour, regardless of what skills are provided. Everyone's time is valued equally.

Advantages of joining the Raglan Timebank are:

- Learning new skills, and sharing our skills with others
- Getting to know the people who live around us: our neighbours
- Supporting and caring for one another
- Promoting equality and social justice
- Re-valuing skills currently undervalued in our society
- Regenerating and building community

Community based organisations can become timebank members as well as individuals. This can provide an opportunity to reward volunteers with timebank credits that they can use in our community to buy skills that they need.
