We spent the day at the beautiful marae, learning a bit about it's history, making fish and flowers out of harakeke, spray painting, and learning about taiaha. Day 5, Friday - we played heaps of fun games, one being Wizards and Warlocks which was like a massive scavenger hunt with obstacles and activities we had to do in order to continue through the hunt and gain points, by now we knew almost everyone in the camp, and everybody felt super comfortable.
